

Attendance Matters

At Wellesley Park, we are deeply committed to our vision of enhancing all children's life chances. A key indicator of our success in this mission is regular school attendance. Our current school target is to achieve 97% attendance by the end of the academic year.



We do appreciate that children can be ill and therefore not well enough to attend school. Any child with attendance of 90% or below is classed as a persistent absence by the

Government. Every school is required to take action to work with families to improve attendance. If your child's attendance does drop below 95%, then your child's class teacher may make contact with you to offer support to understand the barriers to good attendance.

Additionally, we have seen an increase in the number of term time leave requests. Absences can only be authorised in exceptional circumstances. These are defined as situations that are rare, unavoidable and short. Please note that family holidays do not qualify as exceptional circumstance as typically these can be planned during school breaks which means they are avoidable. The government has emphasised that term time should be dedicated to learning and that absences for holidays do not align with this priority.

Online Safety Update - Workshop Takeaways

Thank you to all the parents who attended our recent workshop on keeping children safe on applications. We had a great discussion about the importance of protecting our children online, especially as they use popular apps like YouTube, TikTok, and Instagram.

For those who couldn't attend, here are the key takeaways:

- Age restrictions matter: Most social media apps require users to be at least 13. Always check if the apps your child
 uses are age appropriate.
- Privacy settings: Make sure your child's accounts are set to private, disable location sharing, and limit who can contact them.
- Parental controls: Use tools like Google Family Link or Apple Screen Time to monitor app usage, set limits, and block inappropriate content.
- Communication is key: Talk to your children regularly about their online experiences. Encourage them to come to you if they see or experience something that makes them uncomfortable.
- Recognise risks for younger children: Kids using parents' phones can accidentally access harmful content, make in-app purchases, or interact with strangers.

By taking these simple steps, we can work together to keep our children safe online.



Wellesley Park Explorers

Our explorers have been very busy this half term focussing on 'All about me'. They have settled so well and have started to build lovely new friendships with their peers, promoting their social development which is so lovely to see. We have spoken lots about our family life, making family trees and filling out personal profiles with the teachers, so we can understand who/what is important to them.

The children have also become little artists, using various materials to create self-portraits, promoting our PSED (Personal, Social and Emotional development) which is the foundation behind children developing holistically.

Funky finger activities have been a firm favourite this half term too. We have enjoyed lots of dough disco, cheerio threading and using tweezers to sort various objects. These activities promote fine motor control, enabling children to gain muscles in their fingers to eventually be able to hold pencils to write and zip up their coats. These form part of our Early Learning Goals.

The explorers have been bakers too have made lots of yummy treats to eat at pre-school for snack - 'jam tarts' and 'biscuit faces'. This has also promoted mathematics through weighing and counting ingredients.

We hope you have a lovely half-term and we can't wait to welcome the explorers back for lots of Autumnal and Christmas activities.






Reception


What a busy first half term for the newest pupils at Wellesley Park Primary School! The children have settled in beautifully and have worked really hard- they definitely deserve a rest over half term!

We have learnt lots of new sounds /phonemes and lots of the children are now reading books with words in to sound out and blend. This is an amazing achievement so early in the year and it is lovely to hear the children reading with enthusiasm! We have also learnt three new Tricky Words: is, I, the.

We have been retelling the story of the Little Red Hen but have now innovated it to include our own characters. We then retell the story with the alternative characters. After we did this as a whole class the children then thought of their own characters. Here are two of the children's story maps with their chosen characters. They have used the story map to tell their story to an adult.

A lot of work has been done on repeated patterns in the last few weeks. First, we did patterns using body percussion, for example, clap, nod, clap, nod. Then we used natural objects like conkers, leaves and sticks to make repeated patterns. The children loved exploring making patterns with two or more objects!





Year 1

We cannot believe how quick this first half term has gone! We managed to fit in an immense amount of learning and the children have impressed me so much with their resilience and effort.

After completing our fiction topic on The Three Little Pigs in English, we looked at nonfiction writing. Our focus has been on persuasive language, where we have been persuading someone to buy a house. I have been amazed with the level of writing and use of interesting vocabulary! We have had some excellent ideas, and the children have loved innovating the text to include what they would love in the house!

In Maths, we continued with numbers to 10 but have looked at addition. The children have worked hard with part whole models to help us understand that whole numbers can be split into two parts. This has supported our addition number sentence writing and we will look at subtraction after half term.

The children have worked hard on their phonics this half term. They have begun to learn some phase 5 alternative graphemes for some sounds they already know, which they have done well on. After half term we will continue learning more alternative sounds and I am excited to see this impact their reading!

In Science, we finished our materials unit and carried out some investigations on properties of different materials. The children thought it was amazing when we got to testing out which objects were absorbent or not! It turns out that socks are very absorbent!

We are so proud of all of the children as they have coped massively well with the start of Year One. We hope you all have a wonderful half term!








Year 2

The last few weeks have been very productive in Year 2!

In English, the children have been working very hard learning a whole new set of vocabulary and diary language features. This week, we have had some special items arrive in school... Jack's diary and a beanstalk leaf! Over the next couple of weeks, the children will be innovating his diary.

In Computing, the children have been saying how particular pieces of music makes them feel, identifying patterns, experimenting with sounds and creating musical patterns for a purpose using Chrome Music Labs. Why not continue creating wonderful music at home?

In Guided Reading, the children have been learning about the life of Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III. They have been developing their understanding of vocabulary, such as: reign, monarchy, tradition, inherit, duty, good causes and preserve; and learning how to explain their thinking using evidence contained within the text.




Moon' by Harriet Muncaster. It's a great short chapter

In Maths, we have been learning to add and subtract in a number of ways. The children have taken to this well and are beginning to spot patterns and apply their fluency skills well.

In PSHE, the children have been identifying positive behaviours and discussing feelings and how to deal with uncomfortable emotions.

We hope you have a wonderful and restful half term holiday, and we look forward to seeing you in November.







Year 3/4

We have had a very busy few weeks in Year 3/4. The children have shown great behaviour for learning and have enjoyed getting stuck into lots of different subjects and leaning lots of new things.

In Maths, we have been focusing on addition and subtraction using the column method. All of the children have shown great resilience working with some tricky numbers, especially when exchanging!

In English, we have nearly come to the end of our unit on persuasion. The children have enjoyed learning our model text 'Dragonland', and they have some fabulous ideas for their own persuasion leaflet, including lots of tools we have learnt, such as, rhetorical guestions and alliteration, which we can't wait to read.

In Guided Reading, we have began our new novel 'The Firework Maker's Daughter'. The children have enjoyed the first few chapters and are becoming more confident reading out loud.

This term we were lucky enough to visit Wellington Community Farm. Although very wet and muddy, it didn't stop the children from having fun! We were able to pick our own carrots, go on a bug hunt and do some orienteering. The children loved learning about how to grow different fruit and vegetables.

Year 3 also had the opportunity to visit Court Fields School and participate in a sports festival. They thoroughly enjoyed each activity, from obstacle courses to bean bag throwing and ball sports. Year 3/4 were excellently behaved on both trips and represented our school very well. We are very proud of them!

Year 5

It has been a fabulous end to the first half term in Year 5 with a range of exciting and memorable moments.


In English, we have been writing quest stories focusing on characterisation and recently our chairs unbelievably went on strike! This resulted in us having to write persuasive letters so that they would return. Fortunately, through our use of specific language features we convinced them to come back - phew!

In our topic lessons, we have further explored World War 1 and studied fascinating stories and people such as Jutland Jack. Now that we have come to the end of this unit, the children have all produced some outstanding double page spreads to showcase everything they have learnt this term.

In our Science sessions, we have worked to understand the phases of the moon and answered our intriguing topic question: What is the solar system?

Well done for all your effort this half term Year 5! We are looking forward to another busy term in the run up to Christmas!











Year 6

We cannot believe we are at half term already! Year 6 have had a fantastic start to the year and have shown us what mature, hard-working and resilient individuals they all are. We are looking forward to watching them continue to flourish throughout the year.

In English, we have completed our Talk for Writing suspense unit. The children created excellent stories based on the traditional tale of Hansel and Gretel. They used a wide-range of techniques including pathetic fallacy, personification, dramatic dialogue and show not tell. We are now writing persuasive letters to the witch to release Hansel and Gretel.

We have finished our place value and four operations topic in maths. The children's resilience was tested with tricky long multiplication and division, however, they took everything in their stride and we are now using the techniques to solve worded problems.

This week, we wrapped up our Science learning with heart dissections. The children were fascinated by this activity and were able to consolidate their learning of the heart and make links to what they have learnt.

We travelled back in time during our history lessons and have delved into the Industrial Revolution. This week the children looked at how children were sent to work in factories and have written some fantastic diary entries.

We have lots more to look forward to throughout the year.
